

A LIFE OF EVANGELISM IN A CULTURE OF FEAR



In September 2020, a book was published called *Facing Fear* by Nik Wallenda. And Nik understands fear. He's is a seventh generation daredevil. Nik started walking on a wire at 18 months old. Since then, his high-wire performances have taken him across the Grand Canyon, over Niagara Falls, between two towers in Chicago blindfolded, over Times Square, and through an active volcano.

Nik is fearless. At least he thought he was until he experienced a traumatic high-wire accident in 2017. Miraculously, Nik was not physically hurt, but he was left paralyzed by fear. Eventually, he returned to his passion of performing on the high-wire. But, he was only able to step forward on the wire because he overcame the fear in his head.

Fear is crippling. When it wins we stop moving forward. It is winning in our culture and our church is not immune. We are overwhelmed with alarming headlines about health, economy, religious freedom, vaccinations, government mandates, climate issues and social justice. How do we live a life of evangelism in a culture of fear?

Here are three truths that fuel a life of evangelism in a culture of fear!

1. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear! 1 John 4:18

There is an approach to evangelism that uses fear to drive people to God. But fear won't cast out fear. Only love



can make room in the heart for truth to land. Courage might compete with fear, but love evicts it. Let love cast out your fear, then let that love spill over into a culture of fear. This is evangelism.

2. The Spirit God gives is not a spirit of fear! 2 Timothy 1:7, Romans 8:15

Evangelism is a spiritual work. People don't just need different information, behaviors, and beliefs, they need a different Spirit! As believers, we may hear the same headlines, but we are filled with that different Spirit.

If we are slaves to fear, we won't help others find freedom from it. But let's be honest. Extreme and fearful views often find a following in the Adventist Church. In these end times, let's not be so focused on the crisis that we lose sight of Christ; so gripped with the horrors that we lose our grip on hope.

When we are freed of fear we will stand out in a culture consumed with it. And the Spirit of peace in the Church will, itself, be an evangelistic appeal!

3. He Himself is our peace! Ephesians 2:14

A culture of fear is problem focused. It seeks peace by trying to understand, minimize or fix the problem. But peace is not the absence of trouble, it is the presence of Christ! Evangelism shifts the focus! When scripture proclaims "fear not", it has nothing to do with the problem and everything to do with God's presence ("Fear not, for I am with you" Isaiah 41:10)1. Carry the presence of Jesus into a culture of fear, Jesus in you and you in the world! And know that this is evangelism!

2021 TIME TO REFOCUS ON PEOPLE

Over the last five years as a conference, we have intended to focus on reaching more people with the Gospel, but have often been disrupted in our goal. In each of the last five years, the money that was allocated to Outreach and Evangelism has not been fully spent.

In 2021, we as church members, pastors and the conference team are budgeting to catch up on putting those financial resources to work. Will you pray for someone who is special to you that you will find the right words and the right moment to invite them to join you in the journey to become fully devoted followers of Christ?

We just closed the month of December tithe which has been our best month since March. Thank you for being faithful with your tithes and offerings in spite of COVID-19 and all the financial disruptions. For the year ended December 31, 2020, we were only down -1.26%; God has continued to bless as we respond to Him.


Total tithe in 2020 was \$4,460,066.00. Total tithe in 2019 was \$4,516,767.00.



If you have not made tithing a part of your life, will you give it a try in 2021? Biblically, tithe is defined as 10% of your increase if a business owner or 10% of your income if an employee.

The amount of tithe blessing or windfall was nearly identical. Tithe blessing is

any time when we receive more than \$30,000 from one family or individual in one month and is unlikely to be repeated such as the sale of property or an inheritance. Because this is unlikely to be repeated in a future year, we do not budget on these funds, but can use them for one time projects.

The corona virus pandemic has affected all areas of life including the food industry. In order to survive this crisis, businesses turned to creative ways to meet the needs of their customers by providing "take-out" food since dinein options were prohibited. DoorDash almost instantly became an overnight success by taking the food to the customers. DoorDash CEO Tony Xu said he founded his company to help small restaurants, many of which are shuttering during the pandemic.

With the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic and state health mandates being imposed to mitigate the spread of the virus, churches are forced to seek alternative avenues to carry out the mission and minister to our church members and communities. Perhaps it's time we reprioritize our methodology. Our mission remains the same, as Jesus

stated, "Go, and make disciples of all nations..." Unfortunately, even though we may have quoted this passage numerous times, we still subscribed to the philosophy of "Come, and we will make you disciples..." It's about time that we "Go" where the people are in the community.

This year, our goal is to produce and provide online training for pastors and members each month and quarterly for churches. We will concentrate on best practices in our approach to meet the needs of the people. In addition, we want to encourage and educate members and leaders to focus on connecting with people and making friends for Jesus rather than just focusing on events.

The problem in soul-winning is not the unchurched people, nor the lack of strategies and tools, but believers who are not witnessing and sharing their faith. Why is that?

We often put too much emphasis on our inability to connect, lack of temperaments and lack of training. Until we learn how to depend on the Holy Spirit and ask to be filled daily, then all efforts for outreach will be minimal.

Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit...

Matthew 28:19 NIV

We will need to provide the tools to equip and train, as well as provide resources in connecting with people. The conference will establish discipleship



training, both online and in-person. We will offer training via video conferencing software; limited, in-person training will be available for churches that have not started the Discipleship Master Plan (DMP) Part I training nor completed DMP Part II.

Another resource the conference is looking to provide is leadership development, mentoring and coaching on a monthly basis for pastors and lay leaders. This will involve developing teams to network and collaborate in kingdom growth and church planting.

Finally, we pray that instead of allowing this crisis to be detrimental to the traditional ways most are accustomed to doing church, perhaps, this can be the opportunity to advance and multiply the Kingdom of God.

BABY STEP EVANGELISM

During the first weeks of churches shutting down, I came to the Cradle Roll Room at Hillside O'Malley Church, making sure that all was in place for the new quarter. There was an action, felt or prop ready to go with each song as we learned the story of Jonah, taking turns riding on a blow-up whale. Yet as we wait, still anticipating the return of the children who are now one year older, animal crackers have



grown stale. Children will be moving to kindergarten having reached that magical age of four.

As a young mother, I became a Cradle Roll Leader and, along with my three small sons, started the journey that would take me to this place years later. I have learned many things through the years from incredible mentors, and been blessed to evangelize to the smallest of these church members.

Believing that if you capture the heart of a child in a program that is active, simplistic in presentation and a solid Bible story or lesson as the foundation, they in turn become the youngest evangelist. When a child loves to come to class, is energetic in participation, learns words to songs that are repetitious and simple, parents want to bring them back each week. Parents become engaged in the program when asked, willing to tell the Bible Story as the children sit on a blanket and snack on animal crackers. The smallest baby becomes part of the program as they are rocked in the cradle by the other children while we sing songs that focus on Christ. Parents love that their children, no matter what age, are welcomed, greeted, and feel included. Each parent is acknowledged, welcomed by name and as they leave, thanked for bringing their child to class.

Capturing the child with songs and participation encourages parents to come week after week and be a part of the miracle that happens in their child's lives. They learn about sharing, taking turns, praying, loving, being kind, learning Bible stories and respecting God's creation. Hugs are freely given, making the child feel loved by their teacher.



Cradle Roll is the doorway that leads to baby step evangelism and by God's grace, when it is time for their child to move on to the next class, the parents will continue to come to church and feel comfortable with leaving their child at the door to kindergarten, making their way into the sanctuary to continue their journey.

DOES EVANGELISM HAVE A PLACE IN

SACRIFICIAL CHARITY?

I am sometimes asked what role sacrificial giving has in evangelism. Often in the church, we see a dichotomy between evangelistic and charitable ministries, as if these are mutually exclusive. However, Jesus ministered to both temporal and spiritual needs of the multitudes during His earthly ministry. He taught in synagogues, preaching the hope of the "kingdom realm". He also fed, healed and sheltered the vulnerable, protecting them from natural elements and social ills (Matt 4:23,24); many of which, like the two blind men healed in Matthew 20:34, became His followers.



In the early church, Christ instructed His followers to adhere to two commands: The great commandment to love God and our fellowman (Matt 22:37-40) and the great commission (Matt 28:16-20), to spread the gospel to all nations. These two commands embody both evangelism and charitable action. This was seen in the community of early believers described in Acts 2:42-47. Every believer was faithfully devoted to the teachings of the apostles. Their hearts were mutually linked, sharing with one another whatever they had and out of generosity, they even sold their assets and distributed the proceeds to those in need. The apostles performed many miraculous signs and wonders



and the Lord added to their number daily those who accepted the gospel of Jesus Christ (paraphrased).

Is there a place for evangelism in sacrificial charity today? Absolutely! I see it every day in the lives of our Bush Alaska communities. Our Arctic Mission Adventure (AMA) workers lending a hand in the name of Jesus: fixing houses, visiting the sick, providing a safe place for those in trouble, a warm meal, a kind and encouraging word, a place to learn about Jesus, and baptizing lives changed through acceptance of Jesus as Savior.

I see it in those who sacrificially give in support of our workers and AMA. I see it in those who give clothing, food and Bible study resources. I see it in mission groups that come to repair buildings and administer Vacation Bible School's and day camp programs. Finally, I see it in our prayer warriors who take time out of their busy day to pray over God's people, the work and the lives that need to be touched. Each one committed to offering their time, talent and resources to further God's work in Alaska. In Appeal for Missions, Ellen White wrote:

This is true of temporal as of spiritual blessings. The Lord does not propose to come to this world and lay down gold and silver to advance His work. He supplies men [and women] with the resources, that they may, by their gifts and offerings keep his work advancing. The one purpose above all others for which God's gifts should be used is in the sustaining of workers in the great harvest field. And if men will become channels through which God's blessings can flow to others, the Lord will keep the channel supplied. PH 004 5.1

In a world where many people are espousing individualism and self-promotion, we are being called to evangelical charity – to sacrificially give of our time, talent and resources to believers and nonbelievers alike throughout our sphere of influence and beyond – to point to Jesus Christ as Savior. I am so thankful for the faithful men and women who give of their time, talent and resources to further the kingdom of God in the Bush and throughout Alaska.

EDUCATION IS EVANGELSIM



Arctic Missions | Youth | Radio


When I was pastoring in the local church, I encouraged a shift of thinking from evangelism as being an event, to evangelism as a lifestyle. One of the ways we did that is to talk about evangelism as being "everything" we do. You as a believer are a "walking advertisement" for what you say you belong to. So, as a Seventh-day Adventist, Bible practicing Christian believer, it is necessary to see everything you do as a potential impact for the Kingdom of Heaven.

For many members this has been a relief. It takes the weight off from having to have an "E-V-E-N-T" to being validated in the outreach and ministry done on a daily basis. And of course, there are others that fit on the scale with different thoughts, but for this article, I will be speaking to the position that everything we do can affect the Kingdom of Heaven.

In the ministries I am privileged to lead (Arctic Mission Adventure, Youth & Young Adults), evangelism is embedded in the code of thinking even if it is not spoken in terms of evangelistic outreach.

Arctic Missions for example is the Mission's wing of the conference that focuses on living, teaching and preaching the Gospel to those who live in Bush Alaska. Evangelism must be a lifestyle and practiced in real-life ways or the words spoken are completely ignored. Living the Gospel opens the door to teaching and preaching the Gospel.

The Youth ministry—which encompasses Young Adults, Pathfinders, Camps & Children's Sabbath Schools—has a variety of outcomes; all of which desire our young people to know Jesus personally and grow in HIM for the rest



of their lives and through eternity. It has evangelistic components throughout, but the discipleship journey is pragmatically our strongest outcomes.

Radio Broadcasting Ministry is honestly frustrating when it comes to results. A broadcast DJ can play music, a pastor can preach, an individual can pour their hearts out in testimony, but often you never know the impact it is having on the listening audience. Furthermore, in some contexts, unless you are intentional about getting community feedback, you don't even know who's listening.

The beauty of recognizing that everything we do can have a positive evangelistic impact on someone's life, is that it gives us permission to stop doing trivial exercises, by focusing our life and

efforts on what matters. We stop hosting events for the sake of doing something, to targeting our activity that can impact a life for Jesus. We live our life (belief and practice) that everyone matters to Jesus and all that we do can help them come to know Him better.

That being said, people matter to Jesus, we know that. But ask yourself; have I intentionally reached out to the disenfranchised, a youth or young adult to help them on their journey towards eternity with Jesus? All ages are struggling these days, however, many of our young people lack the support or ability to cope with the challenges of life. Your reaching out to be the hands and feet of Jesus to that person becomes, Evangelism as a "LIFESTYLE".

ALASKA CONFERENCE STRATEGIC PLAN

In Fall of 2020, the conference team came together to outline initiatives through 2024. Three primary ministries were identified, and although time and resources may result in programatic changes, the conference will continue to emphasize discipleship of its churches and members, expansion of the Arctic Mission Adventure ministry, and intentional development of our youth and young adult leadership and mentoring. Below are the major goals for each ministry:

DISCIPLESHIP

- DMP Training: 75% of our churches complete Discipleship Master Plan training
