A Little History of Camp Meetings

Young John Wesley was not having a good time. In late 1735, he had come by ship to Georgia to convert the American natives, but he ended up spending his time railing against the colonists for what he considered their vanity and fancy clothes. While in the colonies, he had his heart broken by a young lady, and it affected his ministry. In less than 24 months he returned to England, discouraged with his ministry and questioning his own conversion, but his influence on one young man named George Whitefield was powerful and transforming.

PALMER SENENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH

Early Alaskan Adventists from the Matanuska Valley Area

George Whitefield spent time in England with Wesley and then returned to the colonies. He landed in Delaware then preceded to travel up through Massachusetts, north to Maine, preaching repentance and conversion. Because of the resistance of the more traditional churches, many of his meetings were held in the open air. As he traveled west through the frontier, people gathered in local fields to listen to his messages. Wesley had seen his American adventure as an utter failure. "I went to America to convert the Indians," he later wrote, "but, O! Who shall convert me?" Yet how little he knew of the impact he was to have.

As the "Great Awakening" grew in strength from Whitefield's preaching, Ben Franklin quipped, "From being thoughtless or indifferent about religion, it seem'd as if all the world were growing religious, so that one could not walk thro' the town in an evening without hearing psalms sung in different families of every street."

The spiritual undercurrents of that movement led to new churches springing up spontaneously around the country. Bible study groups were constantly being introduced and new levels of commitment to Jesus and love for each other were formed as the Great Awakening spread.

Camp meetings exploded around the frontier, sometimes housing as many as 10,000 people for up to two weeks at a time. Because they weren't chained to a church building and traditional forms of worship, many young people joined. It was a new faith for a new nation. By 1830, the Methodist Church formed the largest church in America fueled by camp meetings.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church in the early stages of the development, took up the mantle of teaching through a camp meeting style and it was a key component in spreading the message of the soon coming Savior.

Since then, these annual gatherings have become a place of renewal, spiritual growth and precious fellowship for Adventist church members. Why not come this year? You will be richly blessed.

Despite her predictions, it was at camp meeting that God planted a seed of love

in my heart. No matter how far I would fall, I would still hear the foot steps of my Savior walking back and forth at Adventist camp meetings. From Oregon, Arizona, Michigan, Wisconsin, and in the great state of Alaska, the trumpet sound of the Three Angels Message would keep my eyes on the Great Controversy and God's promise for me.

There is something spiritual and wonderful about camp meeting and

the Alaska Conference is doing everything it can to provide its constituency with quality meetings. Whether at Southeast, Southcentral or the Interior, there will be someone who will surrender their life to Jesus or rededicate it. Even as this article is being written, the speakers are praying and preparing to present a message that will allow the Holy Spirit to work on someone's soul. Pavel Goia knew at a young age that God had called him to ministry. Born and raised in communist Romania, he didn't find it easy to follow that calling. After drifting during his teenage years, his life took a proverbial turn, and he promised to fulfill his original calling. His promise was tested almost immediately. The events that ensued are chronicled in *One Miracle After Another: The Pavel Goia Story*, by Gregg Budd. Pavel pursued careers in engineering, private business, and law before finally settling into ministry. Today he pastors the Lexington SDA Church in Lexington, Kentucky, is a member of the Ministerial Advisory Committee for the North American Division, and a doctoral candidate at Andrews University.

Stable and Growing!



The Alaska Conference has been blessed with stable and growing tithe for the past three years! Percentages for 2013 through April 2015 are shown on the provided graph. The figure for April is partially due to having more church reports in on time. Thank you treasurers who help make that happen.

Giving is a spiritual gift that warrants development. It is proper for the church to encourage and assist people in developing the gift of giving. The essence of good financial stewardship is a deepening commitment to the lordship of Christ in the lives of believers. As the leadership of the church casts a vision of what can be accomplished for the kingdom of God, material resources are increasingly seen as a trust from God to be responsibly stewarded, and giving becomes a priority.

The Adventist Church does not undertake fundraising, annual pledges or stewardship drives to fund regular operations. Instead we have used a system originally called "Systematic Benevolence." This biblically based system teaches not only a 10% Tithe but ongoing regular offerings. Teaching includes a discussion of scriptural principles as well as instruction and practical help in developing biblical stewardship in contemporary culture.

Our office has resources for pastors and local leaders who are interested in



developing local ministries. If you would be interested in the book "Beyond Blessings" we have a number of copies available in treasury for free. Also we can help with the Adventist financial course called "Faith and Finance." Many churches will also use other Christian financial courses such as Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University.

We are building on a 150 year Seventh-day Adventist Church legacy. That little group that organized in 1863 has grown to nearly 20 million believers. I don't think that I comprehend a number with that many people but I can walk alongside two or three more people every year.
